#### Successful Aquatic Plant Management Workshop

The 2024 Aquatic Plant Management Workshop held at Go Fish Education Center was а success. Workshop participants learned the basics for aquatic plant identification, management techniques for different aquatic plant species, safety precautions when using chemicals, how to implement a treatment plan, and best practices when applying management aquatic pesticides.

Workshop participants had an opportunity to examine 30 live aquatic plants collected throughout Georgia by Brandon Baker, Amory Cook, Jim Page, Chad Sexton, Hunter Roop, and Jonathon Pritchard.



#### 2024 AFS Hutton Scholars Summit at Charlie Elliott



The Hutton Junior Fisheries Biology Program is an eight-week, paid summer internship, and mentoring initiative for high school students, sponsored by the American Fisheries Society (AFS). Its primary purpose is to foster interest in fisheries and aquatic science among historically underrepresented communities within the profession. Selected students receive a \$3,000 stipend and an all-inclusive trip to the Hutton Scholars Summit. The 2024 Summit was hosted at the Charlie Elliott Wildlife Center in Mansfield, Georgia.

Kendra Collier, Loganville Christian Academy, had the opportunity to work and learn from some of the best at UGA Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources.











#### **2024 Georgia DNR Career Academy**

This year's Georgia DNR Career Academy was held July 21 - 27 at Charlie Elliott Wildlife Center in Mansfield and the Jekyll Island 4-H Center on Jekyll Island. High school students from around the state had the opportunity to explore future career options, receive training and education, and make connections with current DNR employees. Attendees worked alongside field professionals and receive hands-on training from game wardens, park managers, and wildlife, fisheries, and marine technicians while traveling across the state visiting wildlife management areas, state parks, fish hatcheries, historic sites, and Georgia's coast.

#### Chattahoochee Riverkeeper River Warriors

The Chattahoochee Riverkeeper Water Warriors program seeks to empower students as river advocates through educational and outreach opportunities, helping young people foster connections with their communities and the Chattahoochee River. College and high school students can become a Water Warrior during the school year and and while on summer break.

Water Warriors make a positive impact by participating in fundraising campaigns, arranging outreach events, and engaging with the local community to raise awareness about preserving the Chattahoochee River Basin. This opportunity will help them develop valuable leadership, communication, and outreach skills.











The **application window** for this program opens on July 31st and **closes on September 20th**. Any applications received afterward will be considered on a case-by-case basis. CRK admits students in high school (including rising 9th) and college students (until graduating seniors).


# Donor Highlight

#### HOW WE SELECT A VENUE FOR THE GEORGIA AFS ANNUAL MEETING

When selecting a venue for the Georgia AFS Annual Meeting, the Planning Committee is frequently asked about the rationale behind our choice. While we receive various venue suggestions, many fall short of fulfilling our requirements.

#### SELECTING DATES

Our timeframe for the annual meeting is between mid-January to mid-February. Before mid-January many students have not started their Spring Semester and after mid-February many of our other members are out doing fieldwork. We also need to work around the dates of the Southern Division AFS meeting as some of our members attend both meetings.

#### SELECTING THE CITY

The Planning Committee maintains a list of venues around Georgia that meet our needs for a successful annual meeting. We rotate cities to be more accessible to attendees from different regions. A contract is signed with the hotel or conference center that commits the Chapter to filling a specific number of room nights, reserving a ballroom, and organizing an awards banquet dinner. The Chapter could lose a significant amount of money if we do not fulfill our contract with the hotel. The Planning Committee avoids venues located in North Georgia as snow or ice on the roads can significantly reduce our attendance or force us to cancel our meeting.

#### SELECTING THE SPECIFIC VENUE

When selecting a venue the Planning Committee uses a checklist of what we must have and what would be nice to have.

- 4200 square feet or greater
  - Space for 150 (banquet seating)
  - Space for Fundraiser
  - Space for Posters (~ 20)
- Hotel has a minimum of 70 rooms
- Hotel room rates are affordable for participants (at or near gov't. rate)
- Excellent WiFi service (hybrid mtg.)
- Meeting space and hotel under the same roof or short walking distance
- · Price of food & beverage fit our budget





  - Anyone can submit a nomination.
- Is a nomination letter required for all Georgia AFS awards?
  - A nomination letter is not required for an \*FPY or FCY award. A short summary explaining
    why the nominee should be considered is required on the nomination form. All other
    awards require a nomination letter. Visit the website for more details.
- Do nominees need to score exemplary for all of the standards for an FPY or FCY award?
  - Nominees are not expected to score exemplary in all standards.
- . When is the deadline to submit nominations?
  - Nominations for Georgia AFS FPY and FCY awards are due Dec. 30, 2024
  - Nominations for the other awards are due January 17, 2025

- Presentation Title
- Presenting Author (with contact information; work address and email)
- Co-authors (with contact information)
- Abstract (300 words max)
- Presentation type: Oral or Poster (Minimum poster size of 24" x 36" and maximum poster size of 48" x 36" - check with your advisor as to what they require)
- · Please also indicate if you are a student presenter

Oral presentations are 15 minutes (10 minutes for presentation and 5 minutes for Q&A)

- \*Participants may use general art supplies including, but not limited to glue, tape, wire, twine, rope, paint, markers, pencils, crayons, etc.
- For the base, the artist may use wood, canvas, cardboard, or any other solid structure to hold the trash in place. It can be purchased or something you want to repurpose.
- Trash should be cleaned and sterilized before using. A 10% bleach and water solution is suggested.
- Artwork may be any art medium: sculptures, collages, murals, etc. Creativity is key.
- \*Maximum size of art should fit in a 50cm x 50cm x 50cm space. Artwork must be able to stand alone.
- All projects must be safe to handle (no hazards, etc.) and socially and culturally appropriate (See DQ list on website)
- All entries agree to have photos of their artwork posted to Georgia AFS Facebook and Instagram and in the Chapter newsletter
- · All entries must be removed from the conference center by the end of the annual meeting

## **Chapter Spotlight**

#### **Amory Cook**

Amory, a Fisheries Technician III, works for the Wildlife Resources Division of Georgia's Department of Natural Resources. Her location varies depending on her daily schedule, either at the Fort Valley regional office or Flat Creek Public Fishing Area in Perry. Amory combines the roles of a district technician and a Public Fishing Area (PFA) technician. As a district technician, her responsibilities include performing standardized sampling procedures, maintaining boats and trailers, providing technical assistance to the public, transporting fish to stock public waters, and collaborating with stocking program partners to organize fishing events. In her capacity as a PFA technician, she handles maintenance tasks such as mowing, servicing equipment, maintaining roadways, and applying herbicide. Additionally, Amory records water quality data, interacts with anglers, and oversees the region's part-time creel clerk. Notably, she serves as the Angler R3 Liaison, supporting the region's efforts to attract, retain, and rekindle anglers, leading to increased license sales. To further promote fishing, Amory manages her region's two "Reels on Wheels" fishing trailers, which are available for use at events to introduce more people to the sport.



#### What inspired you to pursue a career in fisheries?

I have always had a fascination for nature and knew from a young age that I needed to find a career where I could be outside. Growing up, my uncle would take me saltwater fishing whenever I visited. I was introduced to many strange looking creatures during these adventures and when he presented the opportunity to work on a shrimp boat for a day I answered with a resounding "YES". Once I saw the nets, full of slimy and strange things, I knew that I had to find a job that would allow me to get my hands dirty and experience the mystery of what lies beneath the water.

#### Describe two things you love most about your job.

For example, on the PFA late spring through late fall is the busiest part of the year. Maintaining the area is a constant battle and it can be a struggle to complete my regional duties.

Overall, I am proud to be a woman in fisheries. I am very proud to have mounted a motor on one of our electrofishing boats with no assistance. Within a week of mounting the motor I was driving that boat at the DNR Career Academy for an electrofishing demonstration. I had two female students on the boat that told me the reason that they chose to be on my boat was because I am a woman. I was able to share that I mounted the motor on the boat we were using and show them that it is possible to be a woman in this field and be successful.

I enjoy assisting with various workshops and with the annual meeting. It fulfills me to be able to help and have an event go smoothly. I have met many interesting people at these events by being in a supporting role.

#### Lobsters are fascinating creatures



Female lobsters seek out the most aggressive, dominant male in the area and show their interest by peeing repeatedly into his shelter.

The record weight for the American lobster is 45 pounds.

Lobster blood is colorless. When exposed to oxygen, it develops a bluish color.



Based on scientific knowledge of body size at age, the maximum age attained may approach 100 years. They can grow to be 3 feet or more in overall body length.

Tomalley is the lobster's liver. It turns green when cooked and is considered a delicacy.

"Red as a lobster" is just a tale. Lobsters come in just about every color but red.



Lobsters have the ability to regenerate some of their body parts; for example, the claws, walking legs, and antennae.

Lobsters have two stomachs. One is located in what we'd consider the lobster's head -- right behind its eyes. This stomach contains teeth-like features (called a gastric mill) that are used to crush the lobster's food.



#### **Job Hazard Analysis**

A job hazard analysis is a technique that focuses on job tasks as a way to identify hazards before they occur. It focuses on the relationship between the worker, the task, the tools, and the work environment. After you identify the hazards, you can take steps to eliminate or reduce them to an acceptable risk.

To perform a job hazard analysis, you would ask:

- What can go wrong?
- What are the consequences?
- How could it happen?
- What are other contributing factors?
- · How likely is it that the hazard will occur?
- How can the hazard be controlled?
